

Pizza Express visit


St. Peters Upper School enjoyed a pizza making experience at Pizza Express to understand the dough making process and the different

Art competition entries


Students were invited to enter UCA, You Create Competition, this year's theme was Dreams and our incredible students showcased their creative talent with some exceptional Art.




"Whispers of Wind"






All tasks were completed with great results with particular success to Yellow group's mobile plant stall which visited a number of businesses and staff locally.
